Through our Foundation, we support educational programs that provide leadership camps for young people all around the country. No other organization does more to encourage its members of all ages to have a voice in grass-roots development. We empower people to better live their lives, contribute to their communities, and develop their leadership abilities.

National Farmers Union Foundation works with all age groups, including adults, and is creating more and more adult learning opportunities through our Beginning Farmers Institute, Women's Conference and international Farmer-to-Farmer program. These programs improve the knowledge of farmers both at home and in the field of agriculture. The more

informed farmers and ranchers are, the more empowered they are to use grassroots activism to make positive changes in their lives and communities.

Not only do we educate about cooperatives that complement farmers' operations, but we also support the cooperative business model. Cooperation is a way of life for our organization and our members.

Our education efforts are focused on growing rural leaders and engaged community members who value rural America and where their food comes from. 

## BEGINNING FARMER INSTITUTE

FUF's Beginning Farmer Institute leverages its ability to reach farmers and ranchers across agriculture and strives to cultivate the next generation of American

farmers. Beginning farmers get the support, technical training and empowerment that they need to succeed. This program is especially unique as it brings farmers from all over the country who use different production techniques together to learn critical business skills and develop their leadership abilities.

For the past five years, National Farmers Union Foundation (NFUF) has operated a Beginning Farmer Institute (BFI) to provide new farmers and ranchers with the resources they need to meet our nation's demand for safe, wholesome, and

nutritious food. Our focus for this national program is to develop beginning farmers from all geographic regions and backgrounds, as well as

ages, levels of education, and commodity types. The program gives participants the skills necessary to sustain a successful career in agriculture, emphasizing business and financial planning.

The Beginning Farmer Institute focuses on building confidence in new farmers to enable them to run successful farms. It also encourages them to learn and apply leadership abilities to become actively involved in community organizations. The program is open to new farmers starting an operation of any size, though most applicants are forming small and medium sized farms.

This year's BFI cohort attended training sessions in Washington, DC; Salinas, CA; and Minneapolis, MN.
They learned about topics such as advocacy,

public speaking, leadership, estate planning, taxes, business structures, record keeping, cooperatives and legal issues on their farms. NFU partnered

with The Agricultural Land Based Training Association (ALBA) and the Farmers Legal Action Group (FLAG) to deliver training to the next generation of farmers and expand the program's reach. The BFI cohort networked with this diverse array of farmers and learned more about the challenges beginning farmers face in crosscultural settings as well as how to overcome these obstacles.

## BEGINNING FARMER ADVOCACY & NGAC

TFU works tirelessly to advocate for both the  $oxed{1}$  current and next generation of agriculture. As agricultural demographics shift alongside industry and consumer trends, NFU strives to advocate for the needs of the next generation of producers. NFU's Next Generation Advisory Council (NGAC) works with NFU leadership, Government Relations, Membership and Education staff to recommend areas of focus and training that are relevant to the next generation of producers throughout the US. NGAC is represented by a rotating, non-voting member of the NFU Board of Directors, providing young farmers the opportunity to weigh in on issues that matter to them and gain board experience. NGAC was created in 2015 by the NFU Board of Directors to give newer, younger producers a stronger voice within the organization.

## WOMENS CONFERENCE

Tomen play a critical role in agriculture around the world and in Farmers Union. The annual NFU Women's Conference celebrates women in agriculture while offering them opportunities to deepen their leadership and business skills.

The 2015 conference, Oceans of Opportunities,

was held in Clearwater Beach, Florida January 17-21 and focused on recognizing opportunities for women in agriculture. Keynote speakers included Lilia McFarland, USDA Coordinator of New and Beginning Farmer and Rancher Program and Althea Raiford. Althea is a combat veteran and served as a Navy Seabee. She is currently a military police officer and helps run

her 6th generation family farm in Georgia. She talked about the healing power of agriculture and what being a farmer means to her. The conference included a film showing of the documentary Terra Firma that tells the stories of 3 women farmers who are also combat veterans.



In addition to inspiring keynote presenters and speakers who focused on leadership, the conference covered the 5 areas of risk management: production, financial, marketing, human, and legal. Breakout workshops focused on topics such as: direct marketing, estate planning, crop insurance, food safety, social media, balance sheets and business planning.

The conference includes a day of farm tours. Attendees visited different farms and businesses that are owned and operated by women, including a winery and two commercial strawberry farms. The conference also provides valuable networking opportunities where women can find mentors and peers by connecting with other producers from across the US. Conference attendees come from farms of sizes and production types.

## COLLEGE CONFERENCE ON CO-OPS

**¬** very February, students attend the Midwestern College Conference on Cooperatives (MCCOC). The event attracts students and presenters from around the country. More than 150 attendees from 25 states and Puerto Rico participated in the 2015 National Farmers Union (NFU) College Conference on

Cooperatives in Minneapolis, Minnesota.

Participants heard from cooperative experts from across the nation on why member-owned businesses are thriving in industries ranging from senior housing to healthcare. To bring cooperative education to life, students toured housing, retail

and grocery cooperatives in Minneapolis and St. Paul. They also visited the headquarters of CHS Inc., the nation's largest agricultural cooperative. A highlight of the tours was the Mill City Museum, built within the ruins of the former Gold Medal Flour mill, which at one time was the world's largest flour mill. Students heard from cooperative

leaders, farmers and government experts who explained the current challenges they face.

Presenters at CCOC ranged from members, directors, employees and managers of traditional and value-added agricultural cooperatives to representatives of housing and worker-owned co-ops, as well as consumer cooperatives such as REI and natural foods co-ops. These professionals offered insights on cooperative development. This year's conference also emphasized opportunities for cooperative careers as well as the impact of cooperatives in international development. In addition to hearing from co-op professionals in business and retail settings, conference participants heard from farmers who are members and growers for different types of agricultural cooperatives.





## WORLD FARMERS' ORGANISATION

he World Farmers' Organisation (WFO) is an international organization that aims to strengthen farmers' positions within value chains, with a particular focus on smallholder and family farmers. The WFO General Assembly adopted a pronouncement of the world's farmers on the need to produce a sustainable and environmentally conscious food supply that will be sufficient for the estimated 9.2 billion people who will inhabit our planet by 2050.

The Farmers Union delegation consisted of Dave Velde, NFU General Council and Vice President of International Relations; Mark Watne, North Dakota Farmers Union President; Doug Peterson, Minnesota Farmers Union President; Alan Merril, Montana Farmers Union President; Darin Von Ruden, Wisconsin Farmers Union President; Robert Carlson, former North Dakota Farmers Union president and first president of the WFO; and Sue Carlson, former president of Wisconsin Farmers Union and WFO Women in Agriculture


### NFUF SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAMS


National Farmers Union Foundation annually distributes thousands of dollars of scholarships to students furthering education at a two- or four-year college or university.


